Doing Good

"My help comes from God, the maker of heaven and earth." Psalm 121:1

Dear Ones,

Happy Sunday! I hope that you have found a way to worship today, either with our Moderator, The Right Reverend Richard Bott, or with another church community which is broadcasting its worship service. Joining this wider circle keeps us from being isolated, and connects us to the great company of saints!

We had a query this week from Carolyn who was asking how she could continue to support the local Food Banks in this time of isolation. Were we still gathering food at the church? I will give you the details on how to do this below, but what struck me immediately was the generosity and compassion which lie behind this question. It boils down to: I am a helper, how can I help?

The first thing I notice is about <u>identity</u>: "I am a helper." Even when we are keeping a safe distance from others, some of us in strictest isolation, our *identity as people of God* does not leave us. We are people who walk in the light. We are committed to being in the world as people who work for good: "What good is it, my brothers and sisters, if you say you have faith but do not have works?

"What good is it, my brothers and sisters, if you say you have faith but do not have works? Can faith save you? If a brother or sister is naked and lacks daily food, and one of you says to them, 'Go in peace; keep warm and eat your fill,' and yet you do not supply their bodily needs, what is the good of that? So faith by itself, if it has no works, is dead." (James 2:14-17)

The second thing I notice is about <u>mission</u>: "how can I help?" All of our former means of helping others may now be unavailable to us: visiting, baking, running errands, fixing their lawn mower. But this does not stop us from finding new ways to reach out. We are finding new "hows", like writing letters, making phone calls, or sending donations to agencies whose mission we support. Our *mission as people of God* does not leave us.

And when you add identity and mission you get vocation – which is our calling:

"We are called to be the Church:

to celebrate God's presence,

to live with respect in Creation,

to love and serve others,

to seek justice and resist evil,

to proclaim Jesus, crucified and risen,

our judge and our hope.

In life, in death, in life beyond death,

God is with us.

We are not alone.

Thanks be to God."
